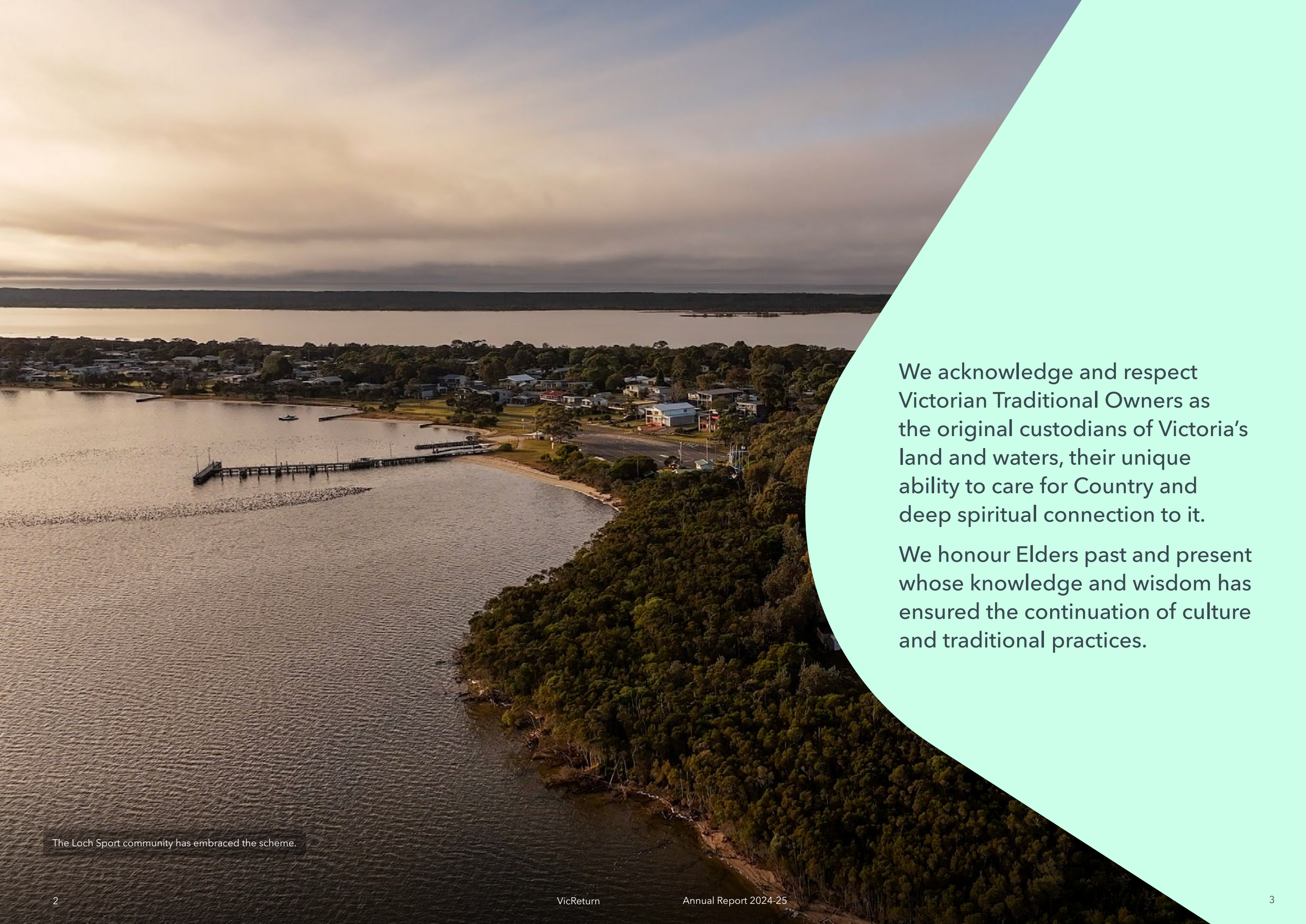

Keeping our state clean, green and beautiful

Victoria is blessed with remarkable natural beauty – from coastlines and rivers to parks and bushland – and we all share a role in protecting it. To help conserve our environment, reduce litter and support a more sustainable future, the Victorian Government launched

Victoria's Container Deposit Scheme in November 2023, appointing VicReturn as the independent, not-for-profit scheme coordinator.

The scheme's first full financial year, 2024-25, marked a period of growth, stability and achievement.

From the return of our first billion containers to the rapid expansion of refund points, Victorians have embraced the scheme as part of daily life. Container returns continue to accelerate, milestones have been met across the network, and community participation is stronger than ever.

The pages ahead detail these achievements – the progress made, the collaboration that shaped them and the impact already being delivered across Victoria.

Impact in the community

Can-bassador's \$15,000 lifeline

Since Victoria's Container Deposit Scheme began in 2023, self-proclaimed 'can-bassador' Sayo Leahy has collected more than \$15,000 in what she calls her 'bincome'. The Reservoir student leaves CDS Vic-branded wheelie bins at parties, sports clubs, and pubs to be filled with eligible containers, returning later to collect the haul. The scheme has been a real lifeline for Sayo. Her creativity and enthusiasm show how the scheme can turn litter into lasting personal, community and environmental benefits.

Little recyclers make big change

With Traralgon Primary School's permission, the Ruff family placed a trailer in the school car park, where the whole community could drop off eligible drink containers. They even added a step to the trailer, so the "little recyclers" could get involved. The trailer helped facilitate the return of more than 25,000 containers, raising \$2,500 for the school - a win that shows how building strong recycling habits early can lead to big community gains. To thank them for their efforts, and in collaboration with CDS Vic partner Carlton Football Club, the family was treated to a VIP on-ground experience at the MCG.

From cans to caravan

By November 2024, Camperdown's Brian Stewart had turned more than 100,000 bottles, cans and cartons into more than \$10,000 - enough to buy a caravan for fishing trips to Yambuk. A lifelong recycler, Brian rides his modified bike and trailer through town each week, filling old wool bales with his finds before driving them to the Reverse Vending Machine in Terang. His story shows how 10 cents can quickly add up.





Meet 'Can-Do'

Making their public debut for the scheme's first birthday at the Message in a Bottle launch at Scienceworks on 1 November 2024, beloved CDS Vic mascot 'Can-Do' puts a friendly face to the scheme. Bringing recycling to life, the giant blue can is on a mission to inspire Victorians to return containers and help make our state cleaner and greener!

Enthusiastic, fun and friendly, Can-Do represents how returning eligible drink containers can make a positive change for the environment - and your pocket! Since their debut, Can-Do has delighted young and old, sparking conversations about recycling and sustainability at every outing.

On social media, Can-Do has become a fan favourite, sharing recycling tips, posing for photos with scheme partners and the community and bringing personality to campaigns. Whether rocking a moustache for Movember or donning a sweat band to support Run for the Kids, Can-Do's vibrant presence has helped CDS Vic reach thousands online and in person.

Beyond the mascot's Message in a Bottle debut, Can-Do has been spotted giving high-fives at the Melbourne Diwali and Lunar New Year festivals, riding aboard our CDS Vic tram, even appearing in our Win A Million! Cents campaign alongside the Environment Minister Steve Dimopoulos and other VicReturn stakeholders.

The highlight of Can-Do's public career to date? Kicking a footy at Ikon Park with Tom De Koning (aka TDK) and going head-to-head with Carlton Football Club's mascots Captain Carlton and Navy Nina in an ultimate mascot challenge.

About VicReturn

VicReturn is the coordinator of Victoria's Container Deposit Scheme. VicReturn is a not-for-profit organisation formed by Lion, Coca-Cola Europacific Partners and Asahi Beverages. Along with board members from our three founding companies, we have an independent Chair, one Director representing the interests of small beverage suppliers, and one independent Director with a background in the waste and recycling industry. Our role is to oversee operations, manage finances, IT systems and governance, promote the scheme, and lead community engagement so the scheme is accessible and understood by all Victorians.

Central to our approach is partnership and collaboration. We work closely with network operators, beverage suppliers, government and the recycling sector to deliver a scheme that is transparent, effective and sustainable. Our collaboration also extends to community organisations, and local groups and companies, building awareness and driving grassroots participation so Victorians can engage with the scheme in ways that are accessible and meaningful to them.

Together, these priorities position the scheme for long-term integrity, growth and impact.

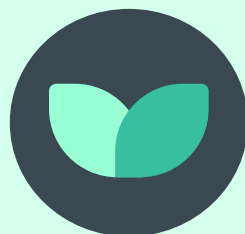

3 How the scheme works

The scheme targets drink containers, including plastic and glass bottles, liquid paper-board cartons, and steel and aluminium cans between 150ml and 3l. By focusing on these materials, the scheme is designed for the return of containers most regularly consumed on the go and found in the litter stream.

Eligible containers can be returned directly to refund points across the state, including Reverse Vending Machines, depots and over-the-counter locations. Every container earns a 10-cent refund, which people can choose to keep or donate to a registered school, charity or community group, helping local organisations raise funds while supporting sustainability. Containers are also captured through Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs) that process kerbside and commercial recycling, ensuring they are not lost to landfill.

Once collected, all material is sold to accredited recyclers and turned into something new - where possible, back to drink containers or food-grade products.

This is the circular economy in action: keeping materials in use for longer, cutting litter and reducing the use of virgin materials.

Partnerships driving the circular economy

CDS Vic is built on a partnership model. VicReturn coordinates the scheme, while first suppliers – the manufacturers, distributors, wholesalers and retailers who place eligible beverages in the market – fund its operation, including the 10-cent refunds.

Across the state, three network operators manage refund points and process returns: Visy in the north, TOMRA Cleanaway in the west and Return-It in the east. MRFs also play a vital role, processing kerbside and commercial recycling to capture any eligible containers that don't make it to a refund point.

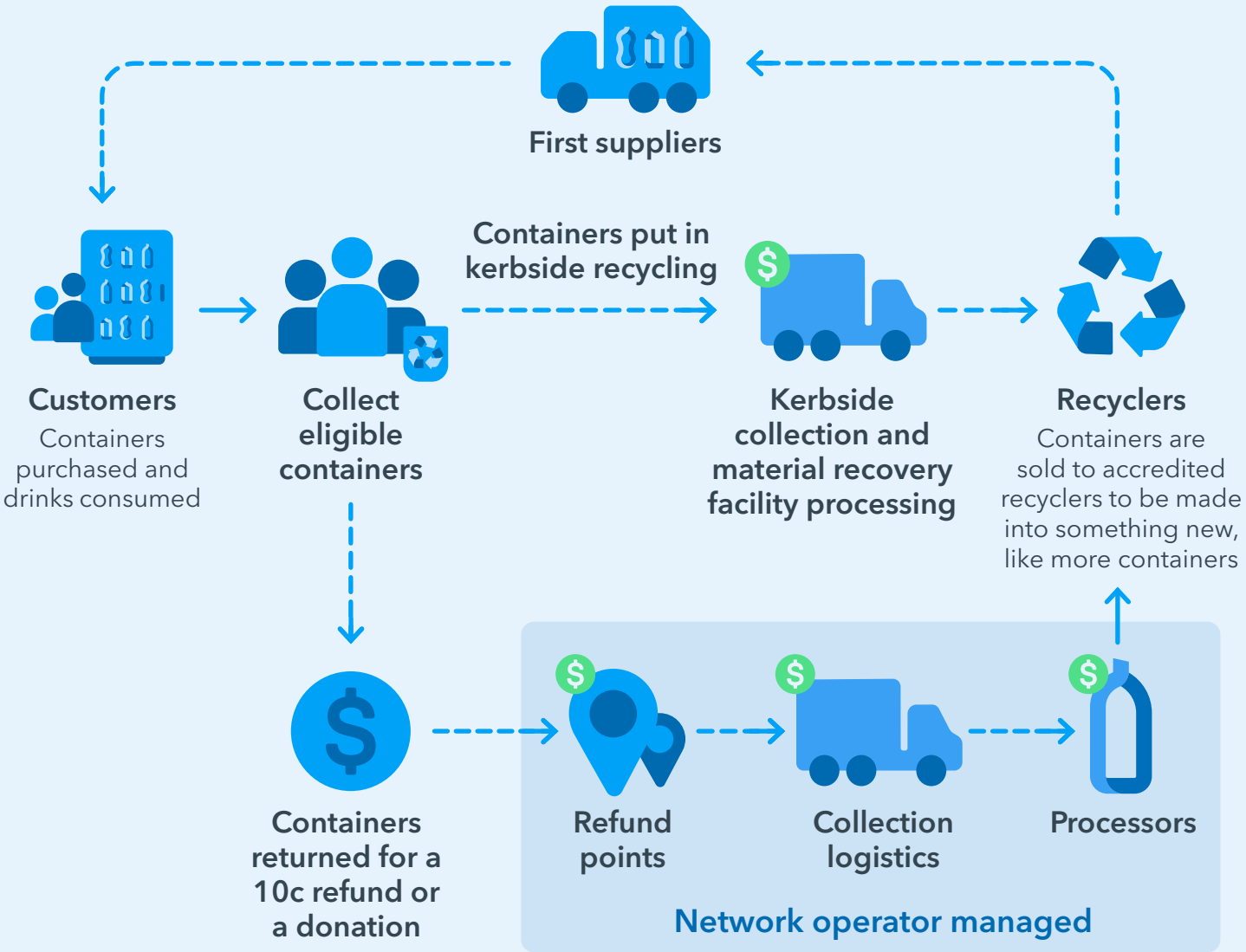
Recycling Victoria regulates the scheme under the Circular Economy (Waste Reduction and Recycling) Act 2021.

Through this collaborative model, the scheme delivers outcomes for Victorians while ensuring resources are recovered and recycled in line with community expectations.

I am proud of the progress we have made this year, and the significant milestones achieved across the network. From the return of our first billion containers to the expansion of our Reverse Vending Machine (RVM) network, every step has taken us further from initial mobilisation towards a streamlined, fully operational scheme that supports Victoria's recycling journey.

By the end of FY24, the scheme was only in operation for eight months, so mobilisation demanded speed and agility. It was a time of rapid deployment, establishment of infrastructure and the creation of foundational brand and scheme awareness. In FY25, our focus shifted to growth and stability. In 12 months, we moved from mobilisation to refinement and optimisation. Today, the scheme is embedded within communities, our partners and across every zone.

This is reflected in our performance. All our key metrics have been met without exception and we have seen container returns accelerate dramatically: a billion containers were collected between November 2023 and November 2024, then almost the same volume again in just eight months. This is a true testament to the enthusiasm Victorians have for recycling as well as the scheme's ability to reward it.

Behind these achievements lies the strength of our partnerships – working closely with network operators to improve the control and security of the network, collaborating with government, the first suppliers who fund the scheme, and engaging with community groups and donation partners to expand participation. It also lies in the everyday efforts that keep the scheme moving forward: implementing new invoicing systems, improving how we measure recycling outcomes and supporting Victorians to make recycling part of daily life.

Milestones such as our first birthday and competitions like Win A Million! Cents have given us the opportunity to celebrate publicly. However, every container returned is a milestone in itself, delivering a 10-cent refund back to Victorians and helping us reduce litter, build the circular economy and create new economic opportunities.

We enter the scheme's third operational year with confidence that the foundations we have laid will support continued growth.

Looking ahead to FY26, our focus is on deepening community engagement, optimising depot performance through further CountAlner deployment and scaling digital tools to personalise customer experience. Community engagement and impact

Throughout FY25, high-profile advertising campaigns, competitions and customer-centred engagement helped us make significant progress toward our vision of making container return, reuse and recycling part of everyday life in a sustainable and circular future.

In November 2024, CDS Vic celebrated its first birthday and a major milestone: 1 billion containers returned directly through the scheme. To mark the occasion, we unveiled Message in a Bottle at Scienceworks, an interactive exhibition that brought the circular economy to life by demonstrating the journey of a plastic bottle through the scheme. As part of the exhibit, primary school children across Victoria wrote 330 messages on the importance of recycling, all of which were displayed inside plastic bottles.

The milestone was officially announced at a media event with Minister for Environment Steve Dimopoulos, where our mascot Can-Do made their first public appearance. Message in a Bottle remained at Scienceworks from November 2024 to January 2025, during which time the museum attracted more than 95,000 visitors.

Our first birthday also coincided with a new advertising campaign, Feel Like a Million Bucks. Tackling one of the most common reservations “Why would I return a container for just 10 cents?” the campaign showed that recycling

through CDS Vic makes you feel richer in many ways, from helping the environment, to supporting community causes, or treating yourself with extra money in your back pocket.

Delivered in English, Arabic, Mandarin, Punjabi and Vietnamese, the campaign reached Victorians through television, online video, billboards and posters in public spaces, radio, regional and multicultural newspapers and magazines, social media and paid online search.

Awareness was further extended through our CDS Vic-branded no.70 tram, which carried our message across Melbourne’s streets for 14 weeks during peak AFL season, travelling through the Richmond sporting precinct near the Melbourne Cricket Ground.

Win A Million! Cents and keep Victorians recycling

As an extension of our Feel Like A Million Bucks advertising campaign, we ran our first statewide public competition over six weeks in May and June 2025. Called Win A Million! Cents, the competition played off the “million bucks” messaging by offering five Victorians each a \$10,000 cash prize simply by participating in the scheme. One lucky winner also secured a bonus \$10,000 for a registered charity, school or community group of their choice.

Launched in May 2025 by Minister for Environment Steve Dimopoulos at the North & West Melbourne Neighbourhood Centre, the competition aimed to boost participation, especially for people new to the scheme and reward Victorians for their commitment to recycling.

Winners came from across Victoria, with stories as diverse as the locations: Wayne finally dropped off saved-up containers on his commute, Kim collected cans on daily walks, and Lucinda returned hers on the last possible day after helping her in-laws collect empty drink containers.

Bundoora grandmother Joanne not only won \$10,000 but also the charity prize, choosing Our Haven Wildlife Shelter in Stradbroke (South Gippsland) to receive the additional \$10,000. Shelter founders Theresa and Tony Matthews, caring for 25 joeys on bottles at the time, were humbled by the donation, describing the gift as “life-changing”. They will use the funding to complete a kangaroo and wombat pen, and to buy feed.

Win A Million! Cents showed how a fun, well-promoted incentive can bring mass awareness, reward individual effort and deliver real benefits for Victorians.

Our Haven Wildlife Shelter won the charity prize of \$10,000.

Partnering for participation

A focus on partnerships was central to expanding our community engagement this year. We approached this work across 8 segments, using activations and events to reach people where they are and build a strong, visible presence across Victoria. Through targeted initiatives, we made participation easier and gave community groups and donation partners new ways to connect with the scheme, engage their stakeholders, and encourage participation among those yet to get involved.

Major cultural and sporting events such as Moomba, the Australian Open and AFL matches gave us visibility with millions of attendees, while community celebrations like Diwali and Lunar New Year highlighted the scheme's role in multicultural life. Business forums, including the Sports Environment Alliance Summit and other waste and trade conferences, positioned the scheme within conversations about sustainability, while school initiatives helped us reach younger Victorians and their families. And at the grassroots level, network operator support ensured local communities were directly engaged - from neighbourhood festivals to regional events - giving people practical ways to take part.

The investment delivered clear impact. By June 2025, 78% of Victorians had engaged with the scheme either directly or indirectly - with people donating refunds or containers to support local groups, up from 66% in December 2024 (based on research conducted by VicReturn during 2024-25). These contributions have helped sporting clubs, schools and community organisations turn everyday recycling into funding for equipment, programs and opportunities, showing how the scheme is making a difference where it matters most.

Education

Education remains a cornerstone of our partnership strategy, fostering environmental stewardship from an early age. Working with schools, we help students and teachers understand the scheme's environmental and economic impacts, while building leadership skills and encouraging young people to become super collectors in their communities. The scheme's influence extends beyond the classroom, shaping family recycling habits and positioning schools as leaders in sustainability.

Highlights from FY25 included our Message in a Bottle installation at Scienceworks, which engaged students in learning about the circular economy. We also commenced our multi-year collaboration with CERES and the Eastern Alliance for Sustainable Learning, delivering teacher presentations, multi-school conferences and student incursions that gave students practical ways to learn and take action. Our continued partnership with Sustainability Victoria's ResourceSmart Schools program further supported schools to embed sustainability and celebrate leadership in waste reduction.

Together, these initiatives are helping to inspire a new generation of Victorians to see the value in every container—and to lead the way towards a cleaner, more sustainable future.

Impact from classrooms to lounge rooms

We partnered with Sustainability Victoria's award-winning ResourceSmart Schools program to support and celebrate schools that embed recycling and waste reduction into everyday life. The initiative provides practical tools to help schools cut resource use, save money and integrate sustainability into the curriculum.

In FY25, two schools stood out among the 13 CDS Vic Award entrants, for how they wove the scheme into their culture.

At Wandin Yallock Primary School in the Yarra Ranges, the student-led Enviro Squad has turned drink-container recycling into a whole-school effort. Known as 'waste warriors', they collect containers during breaks, sort them, and return them to local refund points. Families, grandparents and local businesses pitch in by dropping bags of cans and bottles at the school. Refunds have funded water tanks, composting infrastructure and expanded garden beds – all while giving students hands-on experience in teamwork, leadership and practical waste-management.

In Geelong, Kardinia International College's Earthcore group created an initiative to collect eligible drink containers. Campaigns such as 'Bin It to Win It' and 'Sort Smart, Win Big' tackle contamination and encourage participation. Refunds have contributed to school gardens, biodiversity projects and social causes.

In recognition of their achievements, at the 2025 ResourceSmart Schools Awards, Wandin Yallock Primary School and Kardinia International College were named winners of the CDS Vic Excellence Award in Primary and Secondary categories respectively.

Sport

Grassroots sport – especially local footy and tennis – sits at the heart of many Victorian communities. To tap into this connection, we partnered with AFL Victoria, Tennis Victoria and local clubs to deliver engagement across mid-tier and grassroots levels. These partnerships helped us meet our goal of connecting with communities in targeted and meaningful ways.

By working with clubs as fundraising partners, we created trusted local champions who could mobilise participation. Whether through returning containers themselves or encouraging donations of refunds and containers, these clubs promoted indirect participation while reinforcing the scheme as a practical way to support local sport.

Impact from crowds to clubrooms

AFL was born in Victoria and remains one of the state’s biggest sporting passions. With its wide reach into metropolitan, regional and rural communities, partnering with AFL Victoria and Carlton Football Club was a natural fit for the scheme. It allowed us to harness the game’s popularity and visibility to drive recycling awareness, while helping local clubs turn eligible containers into cash for their teams.

CDS Vic signed on as a gold partner with the Blues – one of AFL’s oldest clubs with a passionate fanbase. It put our brand front and centre each match day from LED stadium signage to the coach’s laptop.

CDS Vic ambassadors, AFL’s Tom De Koning and AFLW’s Darcy Vescio, are helping spread the message that recycling drink containers can protect the environment and support grassroots sport. Both have strong ties to community football and a passion for making a positive impact beyond the game.

This initiative set up local clubs as donation partners, giving them a simple way to boost fundraising while encouraging recycling in their communities. Players, members and supporters across the state can collect eligible drink containers and donate the 10-cent refunds to their club, creating an easy, ongoing income stream for essential items and improvements.

Beechworth Football Netball Club

A great example of this was at the Beechworth Football Netball Club, where volunteer Garry Jarvis showed what determined effort can achieve. Garry has raised more than \$10,000 to date by collecting and recycling eligible containers, funding everything from uniforms and training equipment to new canteen appliances and improved storage.

His efforts are both a reminder that small, consistent actions can make significant change and a source of pride for the players and the community.

By linking the reach of AFL Victoria with the dedication of community clubs, the partnership achieves impact on every level – raising awareness of the scheme, reducing litter, fostering community pride, and helping clubs across Victoria thrive season after season.

Serving up sustainability from centre court to community courts

At the 2025 Australian Open (AO25), recycling wasn't just happening behind the scenes – it was part of the action.

Helped by on-site ambassadors known as Trash Talkers, the initiative engaged thousands of attendees, making container returns fun and approachable, while also educating fans on container eligibility and how to use at the recycling hubs spread across the AO precinct.

What a success! Almost 1 million containers were returned through the scheme and saved from landfill. Refunds were donated to the Australian Tennis Foundation, supporting programs for disadvantaged children and young people, with a focus in Victoria.

Over the course of the event, the waste management team hand-sorted 415,000 aluminium cans, 380,000 PET bottles and more than 131,000 glass bottles – that's almost 75 tonnes of glass saved from landfill.

The sponsorship also boosted awareness and strengthened sentiment, with post-event research showing a 71% increase in trust towards CDS Vic and 59% increase in people feeling positive about the scheme (based on research conducted by VicReturn in 2024-25).

Alongside the partnership with Tennis Australia, we also teamed up with Tennis Victoria to inspire clubs to use container recycling to connect with their communities and raise funds. A friendly competition challenged clubs to collect the most eligible containers, with Romsey Tennis Club

taking top honours. Since the scheme launched in November 2023, the club has returned more than 18,000 containers, raising more than \$1,800 to refurbish three ageing courts. As a celebration of their efforts, four members were rewarded with a behind-the-scenes experience at the AO Men's Singles Final.

From the international stage to local courts, these partnerships show that recycling is win-win for sport and sustainability, on a local and global scale.

Community action

Our segment strategies are designed to influence behaviour change by making the scheme visible where Victorians gather and celebrate. This year we had a strong presence at cornerstone events across Melbourne, including Moomba, Run for the Kids and the Good Friday Appeal's Kids Day Out. Beyond the city, we worked with local government areas across Victoria to integrate CDS Vic into their litter-reduction strategies.

We also partnered with leading environmental organisations, including the Victorian Environment Friends Network and Landcare Victoria. Our support for Keep Australia Beautiful, generated positive media in the lead-up to Clean Up Australia Day, and reinforced our role in protecting local environments.

Partnering with trusted organisations to deliver information in spaces where people already connect, makes participation more accessible.

This included working with business associations with strong reach into Chinese and Vietnamese communities. Together, we activated at culturally significant events, while also extending impact beyond single occasions. Initiatives such as bilingual bin stickers in the St Albans business precinct and targeted trader communications ensured that campaign messages, including those from Win A Million! Cents, reached communities through familiar and trusted channels.

Partnering for cultural connection

With early data showing lower awareness of the scheme among multicultural communities, we prioritised in-language education. To support participation in Victoria’s Vietnamese community, we partnered with the Australian Vietnamese Women’s Association (AVWA). Established more than 40 years ago by and for Vietnamese Victorians, AVWA is a cornerstone of the community.

Through this partnership, we delivered a sustained, year-round program of engagement. This included in-language education, targeted outreach, and opportunities for the community to connect with the scheme in ways that feel trusted and familiar.

Festivals and events provided an important opportunity to demonstrate the scheme’s alignment with community values, build trust in spaces meaningful to intergenerational audiences, and engage local communities to understand sentiment and barriers to participation.

In January, an estimated 386,000 people attended five Lunar New Year festivals across

four LGAs (City of Brimbank, Yarra, Greater Dandenong and Maribyrnong). Throughout, AVWA promoted CDS Vic, distributing nearly 3,000 co-branded Vietnamese flyers and hosting hands-on recycling activities.

During these celebrations, our partnership with the St Albans Business Group Association and the Springvale Asian Business Association came to life. In the spirit of new beginnings and good fortune, festival goers discovered how to find their nearest refund point and learned about the circular journey of a recycled container. And to support collection at home, hundreds of CDS Vic bags were handed out, while bi-language bin wraps in St Albans helped keep the message visible year-round.

Beyond Lunar New Year, AVWA promoted the scheme through other community events and presentations. Container collection was also embedded in everyday spaces – from temples and small businesses to AVWA’s own offices – making recycling part of daily routines.

Economic impact: Shared responsibility, shared value

Building on our outreach in FY25, the scheme delivered strong economic outcomes with almost \$131 million refunded to Victorians. The scheme also generated around 615.5 local jobs across the state, an increase of 18.5 jobs from last year, with a significant amount of those jobs operating refund points. Over 100 of our refund points in FY25 were managed by social enterprises, with many providing employment and training to individuals who face disadvantage or barriers to work such as disabilities.

A total of 2,762 registered CDS Vic donation partners – including charities, schools, clubs and community groups – also received \$1.53 million during FY25. These funds have helped purchase equipment for grassroots sports clubs, expand community programs and enhance services in schools and neighbourhood centres.

These outcomes highlight how the scheme is building economic opportunity and shared responsibility across Victoria. Its success may be driven by the financial return provided, but its deeper impact lies in the benefits that flow from participation – stronger local organisations, greater awareness of recycling and the pride of contributing to a more sustainable Victoria.

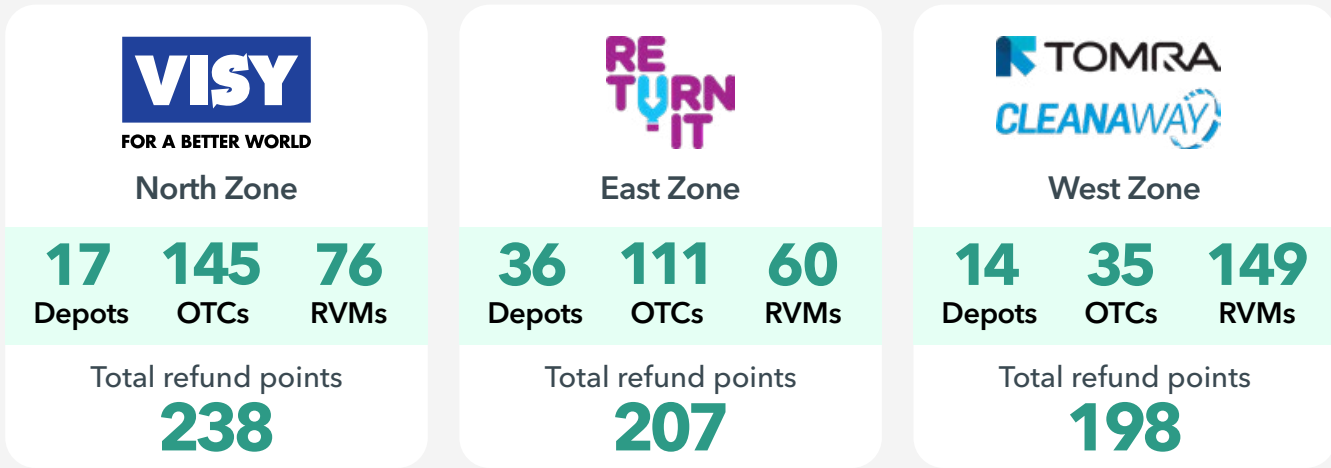


Sustainable operations: Achieving results together

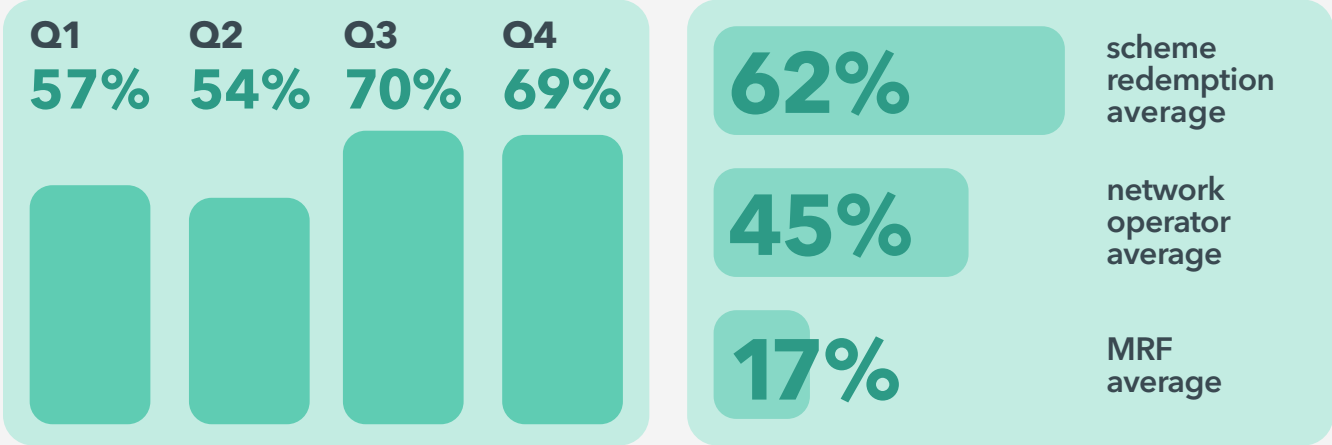
By 1 August 2025, the network was fully mobilised with 643 active refund points across metropolitan and regional Victoria – including 285 Reverse Vending Machines, 291 over-the-counter sites and 67 depots. From Malvern to Mallacoota, Wangaratta to Warrnambool, the scheme is now accessible right across the state.

This reach supported Victorians to return over 1.3 billion eligible drink containers through the scheme this year, with more than 485 million more collected via the MRF network.

Scheme redemption rates for FY25



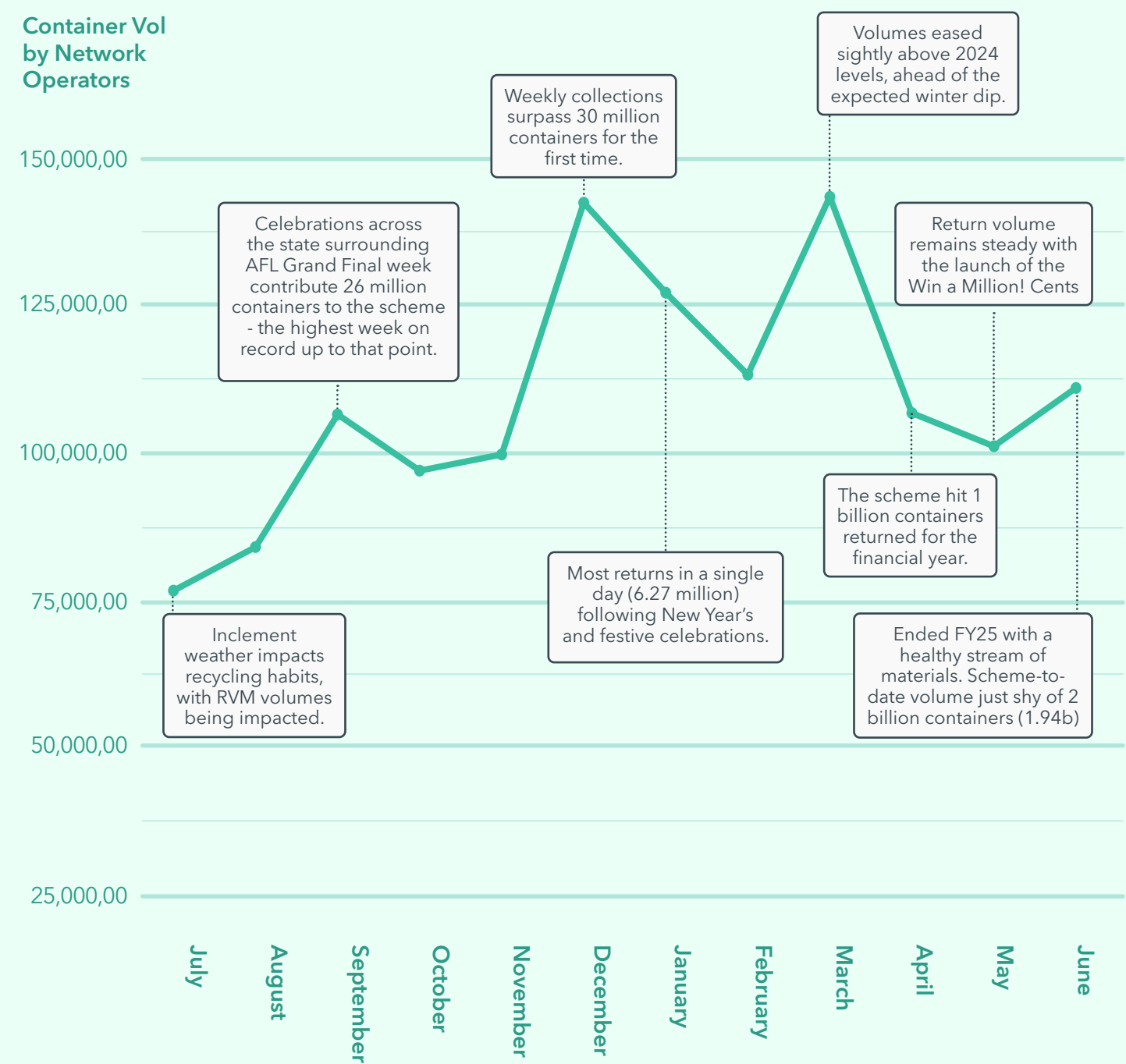
Redemption grew steadily throughout FY25, with Q3 observing a significant jump, which was sustained through to year’s end. By 30 June 2025, more than two out of three eligible drink containers in circulation were being returned, and we ended the year with an average weekly volume of 25.2 million containers – a 40.3% year-on-year increase.

By understanding the factors that influence container returns – including seasonal changes, weather conditions and holiday cycles – we gain valuable insight into how recycling happens across Victoria.

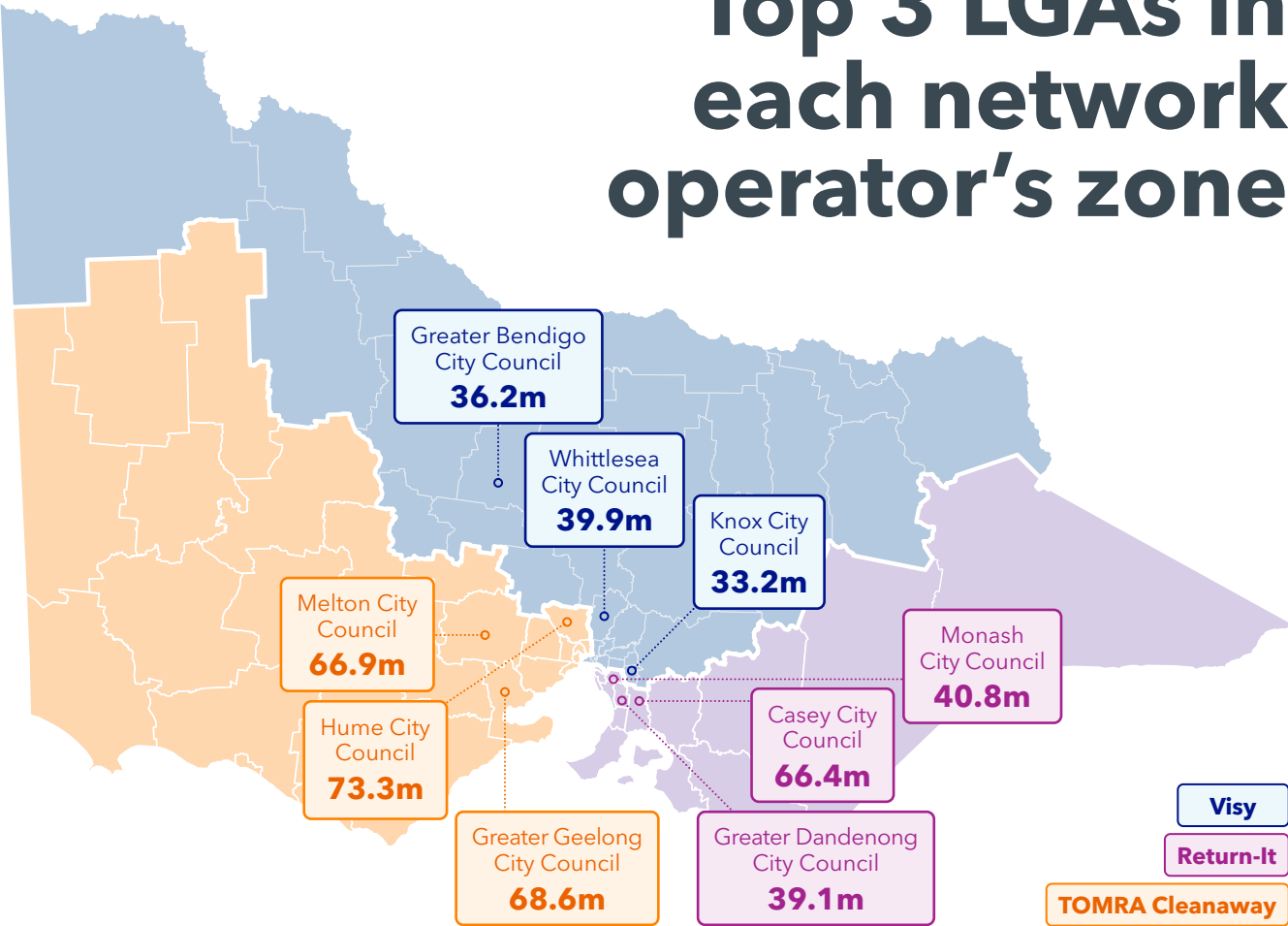
These insights, along with changes in community habits and recycling behaviours, guide planning for the year ahead and shape longer-term strategies to keep the scheme responsive and effective.

Network operator volume

Network operators manage the CDS Vic network of refund points across Victoria. The state has three network operators: Visy (North Zone), Return-It (East Zone) and TOMRA Cleanaway (West Zone). Each network operator is responsible for managing the logistics of collection and recycling for their allocated zone and processing container returns and refunds.

Network operators contributed over 1.3 billion eligible containers to the scheme over the past financial year.

The table to the right shows the volume of containers received by our network operators, creating a clean stream of recyclable material.

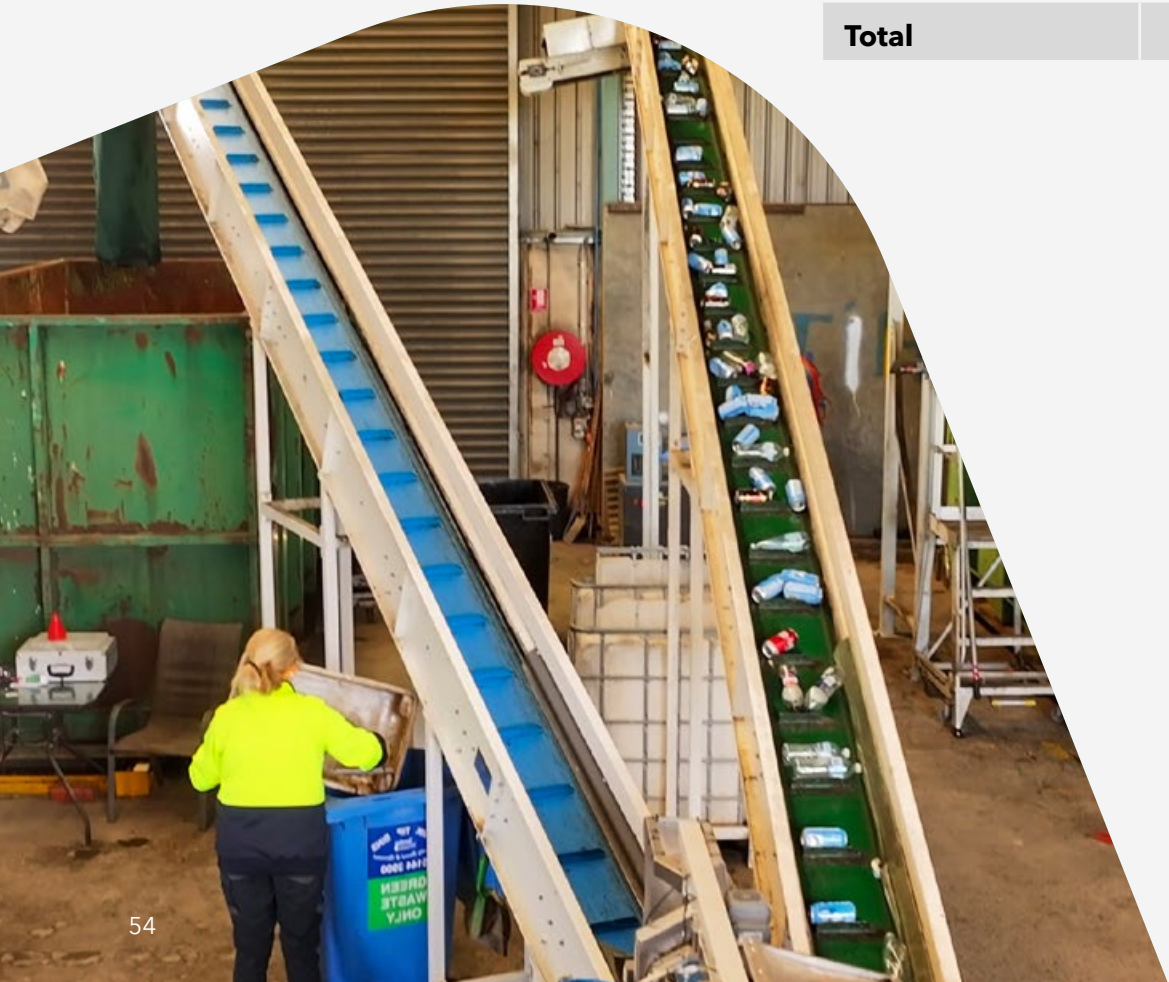
Material Recovery Facilities (MRF) volume

MRFs play an important role in scheme, acting as a recovery agent and collecting materials not captured through CDS Vic refund points. Facilities sort and process council and commercial comingled recyclable material, primarily taking in kerbside bins. Operators of MRFs enter into a recovery agreement with VicReturn to receive refunds for eligible containers processed through the scheme. As of 30 June 2025, there are 12 active recovery agreements in place, with 17 MRFs being paid in FY25.

The MRFs have contributed more than 485 million eligible containers over the past financial year. The table below shows the breakdown by material type received by our MRF network.

Environmental impacts

Since the introduction of CDS Vic, eligible containers found as litter across Victoria have decreased by 71 per cent, according to Recycling Victoria. The Victorian Litter Audit 2024-25 measured the extent and types of litter statewide, highlighting the impact of the scheme since its introduction in 2023. This result represents a significant environmental outcome and reinforces the scheme's importance in protecting our environment.

Community-based audits confirm this downward trend in drink container litter. Beach Patrol surveys have indicated almost 40% less litter of drink containers since the scheme began.

The environmental benefits extend throughout the circular economy. Containers returned through the network operators are pre-sorted by material, enabling more efficient and cost-effective recycling. Turning recycled drink containers into new products also reduces demand for virgin resources and lowers carbon emissions, for example, recycled glass requires 20-30% less energy than production of virgin material, while also cutting emissions and water use. (Source: Recycling Victoria's Circular Economy Market Report 2024)

These results were enabled by strengthened expertise in both VicReturn and our network operators, improving technology, operations and infrastructure. The improvements and outcomes together signal that the scheme has moved beyond its implementation phase and now operates as a stable and reliable service for Victorians.

Operational and process improvements

To further improve efficiency and ensure the operational integrity of the scheme in FY25, we invested in IT infrastructure, strengthened cross-partnership processes and expanded our use of data analytics.

Our data scientists play an essential role in evaluating trends to determine the scheme's impact and growth opportunities. These insights guide future investment in operations, marketing, advertising and community partnerships, ensuring strategies are targeted to where they will have the most impact.

Another key focus in FY25 was supporting first suppliers and strengthening product stewardship across the beverage industry. By 30 June 2025, 856 first suppliers had signed supply agreements with VicReturn and contributed \$388.7 million to the scheme, underscoring both the scale of industry involvement and first suppliers' commitment to Victoria's circular economy.

We also launched our industry-leading container library, developed in-house by our IT, Finance and Commercial teams. The project was a complex undertaking, integrating data sets from multiple external sources into a single seamless interface. It also required cross-partnership collaboration, with our teams working with our network operators to audit which containers are being rejected and to understand why. Now, the library makes it easier to capture suppliers - including international brands that are often harder to track - while speeding up and improving the accuracy of new container registrations by correcting material type and dimension errors.

After six months, this work has allowed thousands of new container registrations, significantly reduced the number of days needed to register new eligible drink products, strengthened data accuracy and improved the customer experience at refund points. CDS Vic is the first state scheme coordinator to implement such a system.

These innovations are driving exceptional outcomes and putting the scheme ahead of where most other Australian schemes were at the same stage in their journey. Our progress is setting a benchmark for the waste industry, with others looking to adopt elements of our approach.

Container price review

Scheme pricing reviews are undertaken at six monthly intervals, with the cost of running refund points and recycling the containers factored into the price. Victoria's scheme has grown faster than any other state at the same stage and has exceeded the original pricing forecast. As the number of containers sent for recycling continues to grow, VicReturn incurs additional operational costs.

To address this, on 1 February 2025 we increased the price per container charged to first suppliers by 3.52 cents - the first and only adjustment since the initial pricing structure was introduced at scheme establishment.



Innovation for process excellence

Across zones, innovation supported both efficiency and participation, as our network operators played a critical role in strengthening the scheme to meet evolving demands of container return volume as the scheme matured.

In the North Zone in particular, Visy rolled out RVMs to replace over-the-counter sites in some regions, to process higher volumes.

In the East Zone, Return-It introduced high-speed counting technologies at select depots, including the industry-leading CountAiner AI sorting machine, allowing bulk collections to be processed more efficiently.

In the West Zone, TOMRA Cleanaway introduced real-time data to dynamically re-route collection trucks, prioritising machines nearing capacity. This world-class approach keeps refund points accessible and convenient, ensuring a better recycling experience for Victorians.

Every container returned through the scheme helps close the loop - reducing waste, protecting natural resources and accelerating the shift to a circular economy.

Counting on change with AI innovation

Return-It has partnered with Canadian technology specialist MachineX to roll out a groundbreaking system called the CountAiner - a high-speed, AI-based bulk container counting machine that eliminates the need for barcode scanning. This innovation was born from Return-It's vision to create the ultimate return experience for customers. Faster, simpler, and smarter returns lead to better outcomes for everyone involved in the scheme.

The CountAiner is capable of accurately processing up to 1,200 containers per minute, enabling near-instant redemption for bulk returns. It's been deployed across Return-It's depot network and within several Material Recovery Facilities, transforming operational speed and precision.

Return-It was in a unique position to drive this change. Drawing on years of operational experience and a robust database of eligible containers in other states, developed using Alchemy optical sorting equipment, the AI algorithms were trained to rapidly identify and count containers in real time.

This innovation marks a major step forward not just for Return-It, but for the entire container deposit ecosystem in Australia. With AI now playing a central role in how recycling is managed, Return-It is helping lead the shift toward smarter, more sustainable infrastructure. This ensures as recycling volumes grow, the systems behind them stay ahead of the curve.

Designed for performance, built for Victoria

Designed, developed and built right here in Victoria, Visy's CDS Vic Reverse Vending Machines combine local innovation, engineering and fabrication expertise to deliver fit-for-purpose technology.

Visy brought together its internal CDS team and specialist division Build Run Repair with regional engineering company JBI Engineering, located in the Latrobe Valley, at Hazelwood. This collaboration has resulted in the successful development and delivery of 79 Reverse Vending Machines made for Victorian conditions, by Victorian workers.

From initial sketches to installation, every stage of the machines' development took place in Victoria, using advanced fabrication and engineering techniques. The machines are built to separate materials at the point of return, with dedicated bins for glass, plastic, aluminium cans and liquid paperboard containers.

This early separation improves the quality of recovered materials, and with cleaner streams of material, there is an increase in the percentage of recycled content remanufactured into new packaging, helping reduce the energy required during processing.

To enhance efficiency further, each machine crushes plastic and aluminium containers, allowing more containers to fit inside each unit, reducing the number of collections and lowering transport emissions.

Visy created more than 800 local jobs as part of the development and rollout of their machines, with most of the manufacturing taking place in Gippsland. These jobs supported regional communities and contributed to Victoria's growing network of skilled workers in advanced

manufacturing and recycling infrastructure.

The project also strengthened relationships between local businesses and demonstrated the capability of regional industries to deliver large-scale, environmentally focused projects.

The success of these locally made Reverse Vending Machines highlights the important link between good design, strong partnerships and environmental impact. By building machines that prioritise material separation and energy efficiency, Visy is helping ensure that more containers are recovered, recycled and reused.

CDS Vic is delivering more than a refund, it is building a cleaner environment, supporting Victorian jobs and strengthening the circular economy.

Live network management

In the CDS Vic West Zone, TOMRA Cleanaway employed bespoke mapping software to design a technologically advanced and accessible refund point network, strategically positioning collection points to meet the needs of residents across metropolitan and regional western Victoria.

The sophisticated management of the West Zone network goes beyond the strategic placement and design of refund points. Daily operations include responsive materials collection, facilitated through real-time network oversight and coordination by TOMRA Cleanaway's logistics partners. This dynamic re-routing of collection trucks prioritises servicing machines as they approach capacity, ensuring refund points remain accessible and convenient for Victorians when demand is highest.

Since the scheme's inception, TOMRA Cleanaway has leveraged its fully integrated technological network and multiple customer touchpoints to monitor consumer engagement continuously. This data-driven approach informs ongoing improvements and decision-making processes.

TOMRA Cleanaway's in-house customer service team maintains full visibility across all network activities, supported by a fully integrated CRM system shared with business partners. This collaboration facilitates the seamless exchange of feedback and behavioural insights across all teams.

The responsive collection system and live management of the CDS Vic West Zone are integral to providing Victorians with accessible, efficient and user-friendly refund points. This enables active participation in the circular economy and reinforces recycling practices that deliver tangible rewards.

Through continuous investment in both technology and personnel, TOMRA Cleanaway is committed to enhancing service quality and delivering the West Zone the best possible container deposit scheme experience.

Industry participation: Assurance and integrity

In partnership with scheme participants, VicReturn is dedicated to safeguarding the integrity of Victoria’s Container Deposit Scheme. In our second year of operation, governance, risk and fraud prevention measures remained a priority as risks and opportunities continued to evolve both within and beyond the operating environment.

Governance and risk management

Risk management is central to understanding and managing uncertainties and opportunities in the design and operation of the scheme. It ensures an additional layer of protection and helps build trust. With an appropriate governance model in place – drawing on both government oversight and private sector expertise – we ensure accountability and alignment with legislative requirements.

VicReturn oversees the Scheme Risk Management Framework. The framework brings together a suite of instruments to manage risk effectively, including the Scheme Risk Management Policy, VicReturn Risk

Appetite Statement, strategic and operational risk registers, the Scheme Incident Response Procedure, and the VicReturn Business Continuity Plan. Dedicated resources and clear accountabilities underpin these activities, supported by the operational audit program that tests and validates scheme processes and controls.

Audit and fraud prevention

In FY25, we undertook more audits, establishing a strong baseline of knowledge and embedding a culture of accountability across the organisation, the network and the scheme. In FY25, VicReturn led the delivery of the following:

- 607 refund point sites were visited by the Operations team and inspected to ensure they were well maintained, accessible, and functioning correctly.
- 13 audits were conducted on network operator processes to validate container volumes at refund points across the network. This was supported by data analysis and multiple ‘mystery shop’ visits.
- 17 MRFs were paid during FY25, with all MRF claims audited quarterly. Local government authorities are eligible to receive a portion of the MRF claims from the MRFs processing their kerbside material, as guided by the Local Government Refund Sharing Protocol issued by Recycling Victoria.
- 40 first suppliers and exporters were audited to validate the accuracy of declared volumes of containers made available for sale in Victoria.
- Other audits: Further engagements have been undertaken to investigate anomalous transactions, with activity resulting in refunds returned to the scheme.

The Scheme Fraud and Corruption Control Plan provides a clear framework to prevent, detect and respond to fraud and corruption across the scheme. It brings together practical measures – from training and procedures to whistleblowing channels and data analytics – to both minimise risks and deal with issues when they arise.


Aided by this framework, we identified several fraud-related incidents, which have either been resolved or remain under investigation. Examples of the type of fraud we have uncovered include:

1. Collection points claiming unverified customer payments
2. Theft of containers from RVMs and re-processing for payment
3. Theft of containers from refund point storage bins for re-processing.

Scheme priorities for FY26

In our first year we mobilised; in our second year we expanded. Now, with the network fully deployed, our focus is on embedding the scheme into everyday life - growing participation, operating efficiently and delivering strong sustainability outcomes.

Although just 20 months old, the scheme has already made a significant impact. More than a billion containers were returned in FY25 alone, keeping valuable resources out of landfill. The next opportunity lies in capturing the remaining two billion containers consumed each year. To do this, we will expand our reach, working more closely with businesses, the hospitality sector and facility managers to recover volumes moving through commercial waste streams. We will also focus on multi-dwelling units and apartment complexes, where waste management is often more complex.

Innovation will remain central to our approach. We are investing in IT, data analytics and new technologies to improve scheme efficiency, strengthen integrity and minimise fraud to ensure public trust and confidence. At the same time, we are enhancing public recycling infrastructure by partnering with councils and commercial operators to expand collections at hospitals, events and shopping centres. A new pilot will see CDS Vic baskets attached to public litter bins as part of collaborations with LGAs across the state, encouraging convenient on-the-go recycling and creating new opportunities for community fundraising.

We are equally committed to engaging Victorians in meaningful ways. Our education and outreach strategies will highlight the environmental and social benefits

of participation, delivered in multiple languages and to diverse communities. Partnerships with schools, community groups and sporting clubs will continue to create opportunities for grassroots involvement, while major activations with Zoos Victoria, CERES and the Royal Melbourne Show will bring the scheme to life on a bigger stage.

As we move into the scheme's third year, our focus is on building momentum in the community. By strengthening business fundamentals, supporting first suppliers and working closely with network operators, we are well placed to keep billions more containers out of landfill and accelerate Victoria's shift to a circular economy. At the same time, we remain committed to continually improving the customer experience - making returns faster, easier and more rewarding - so recycling becomes second nature for every Victorian. With the passion and expertise of the VicReturn team, and the continued support of communities across the state, we are setting a new benchmark for recycling in Australia.

Principal activities

The principal activity of the company is to be the Scheme Co-ordinator of Victoria’s Container Deposit Scheme (CDS Vic), which commenced on 1st of November 2023. The registered office and principal place of business of the Company is at Level 15, 575 Bourke Street Melbourne VIC 3000.

Objectives

At VicReturn we are motivated to help keep beverage containers out of landfill, creating clean streams of recycled materials that help to build our Circular Economy by promoting product stewardship of all First Suppliers in Victoria.

As the appointed Scheme Co-ordinator for Victoria’s Container Deposit Scheme (CDS Vic), we work with government and our partners to build and operate a large-scale container recycling network, a key step in transforming Victoria’s waste and recycling system. Through a 10c refund for every eligible container returned, we encourage Victorians to collect and recycle their containers, making a positive difference to our people, environment and local industry.

Under the Company’s Constitution, the primary objective of the Company is to administer CDS Vic, which includes:

- ensuring ongoing, efficient and effective arrangements are available in Victoria for empty beverage containers to be collected, sorted and recycled;
- ensuring suppliers of beverage products fund the Scheme by requiring suppliers to pay sufficient amounts under supply arrangements;
- setting the amounts payable, or the method for working out the amounts payable, under the Scheme by suppliers of beverage products to fund the Scheme;
- marketing and promoting the Scheme to ensure public awareness of the Scheme and the location of the container refund points;
- auditing Scheme Participants to ensure the integrity of the Scheme and minimise fraud; and
- otherwise fulfilling the role of Scheme Coordinator, including satisfying any conditions of the appointment as Scheme Coordinator.

In the long term, the company seeks to achieve positive outcomes for the Victorian community as a whole as a result of administering the Scheme, which include:

- increasing the recovery and recycling of empty beverage containers;
- reducing the number of empty beverage containers that are disposed of as litter or landfill;
- ensuring that beverage suppliers take product stewardship responsibly;
- providing opportunities for social enterprise and benefits for community organisations;



Notes to the financial statements

1. Material accounting policies

The company is operating as a not-for-profit. The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Company has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB'), the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and associated regulations and the Corporations Act 2001 (Cth), as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and on accrual basis. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is the Company's functional and presentation currency.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the company's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Revenue recognition

The company recognises revenue as follows:

Scheme Contributions

The Company as the Scheme Co-ordinator of the Victoria's Container Deposit Scheme (CDS Vic) under the Circular

Economy (Waste Reduction and Recycling) Act 2021 ("the Act"), enters into Supply Agreements with eligible First Suppliers to receive contributions to cover the costs of administering the Scheme. Whilst these Agreements represent an enforceable contract, the contributions received from First Suppliers fall under AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities, as there is no sufficiently specific promise specified in the separate Agreements with First Suppliers to be delivered by the Scheme Co-ordinator. Revenue is recognised as the amount owed by relevant suppliers of beverage products under the terms of the Scheme. This is calculated upon the number of eligible containers sold into the Victoria market during the financial year, as defined by the Act.

Finance costs

Finance costs attributable to qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the asset. All other finance costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Notes to the financial statements

Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Trade receivables are due for settlement within 5 business days.

The Company has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue.

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Company prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

Borrowings

Loans and borrowing are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received, net of transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Leases

At inception of a contract, the company assesses whether a contract is, or contains, a lease based on whether the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

The cost of right-of-use assets is comprised of the initial measurement of the liability, any lease payments pre-commencement date, offset by any lease incentives received, initial direct costs and restoration costs, if applicable. The cost is depreciated over the shorter of the asset's useful life and the life of the lease on a straight line basis. The Company maintains an office lease with a 5 year term. Lease liabilities are measured by the net present value of fixed payments, offset by any lease incentives receivable; variable lease payments linked to an index or rate if applicable; the exercise price of a purchase option when the exercise of the option is reasonably certain to occur; and payment of penalties for terminating the lease (where the life of the lease has assumed termination). Payments made are allocated between lease liability and finance cost, with the finance cost charged to interest expense over the life of the lease. The weighted average incremental borrowing rate was applied to the lease liabilities. The lease liability is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

Notes to the financial statements

2. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year is discussed below.

Accrued expenses and income

Recognised amounts of direct Scheme costs and revenue, and related accrued expenses and revenue were based on actual amounts to be invoiced post year end, with the only exception of Material recycling facilities' processing refunds which reflect management's best estimate of amounts owing to the Scheme Participants. These estimates are based on a number of critical underlying assumptions such as the volumes of containers submitted and processed through the Scheme at a given time.

Going Concern

As at 30 June 2025, the company had net assets of \$37,587,150 (2024: \$14,178,027). The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, which assumes that the Company will be able to continue trading, realise its assets and discharge its liabilities in the ordinary course of business for a period of at least 12 months from the date that these financial statements are approved.

VicReturn, the appointed Scheme Co-ordinator for CDS Vic, launched the scheme on 1 November 2023. The ongoing Scheme Contributions made by the First Suppliers under their statutory obligations will continue to be sufficient to cover operating costs of the Scheme and fees of the Company.

In order to establish and operationalise the Scheme, the members of the Company, Coca-Cola Europacific Partners Australia Pty Ltd, Lion Pty Ltd and Asahi Holdings (Australia) Pty Ltd provided two loan facilities totalling\$12m. This facility agreement was executed on 27 October 2021 and was drawn down by the Company prior to the Scheme commencement.

In addition, the company entered into an additional facility agreement (Scheme working capital) with the Treasury Corporation of Victoria (TCV) on 28 July 2023. The facility agreement consisted of an interest bearing facility totalling \$60m. On 27 November 2024, the Lender and the Borrower entered into the First Variation Deed pursuant to which the term of the revolving credit facility for the company was extended to a period of up to 3 years from the date of the initial drawdown.
